

The purpose of the RIDGE (Research Innovation and Development Grants in Economics) Center for Targeted Studies @ the SRDC is to invest in innovative social sciences-based research that explores the food and nutrition assistance challenges of residents (or their communities) in rural America, including key populations such as Native Americans, immigrants, other racial ethnic minorities, single parents, youth, the persistently poor, and others. This document is intended to provide important guidelines regarding the grant submission

The maximum amount allowed for a RIDGE grant

proposal is \$35,000. Applicants will be allowed to

include a 10% indirect cost rate in their budget request.

However, the total amount of the budget cannot exceed



New RIDGE Program for 2011




- A new initiative launched as part of the 2011 RIDGE competitive grants program
- PhD students from accredited higher education institutions in the U.S. are eligible to apply (currently at the ABD stage)
- Research must be conducted in the U.S. anywhere in the nation.
- At the end, grantees are required to submit a product that can be of value to practitioners and policy people






- Successful Phase I project launched in 2009-10

Broadband Adoption



- Increased engagement of Extension in Broadband Adoption activities as part of the BTOP
- SRDC is working to create strong working ties among these and other states
- We've spearheaded the submission of an *AFRI "seed funding"* proposal in March 2011
- Team involved in proposal: 2 RRDCs, 5 LGUs, and ERS researchers. Team will expand if funded.
- Purpose: Develop and implement a common research plan for data collection across multiple states; share broadband/e-commerce educational resources with Extension teams

Stronger Economies Together

- SET is an exciting initiative launched in 2009 by USDA RD in partnership with the RRDCs and their LGU partners
- Its purpose is to strengthen the capacity of communities/counties in rural America to work together in developing and implementing (on a multi-county regional basis), an economic development blueprint that strategically builds on the current and emerging economic strengths of their region.




Why We Launched SET




- Increasing concern about the economic health of many rural areas in the U.S.
- USDA Secretary Vilsack's commented:

"I have reached the conclusion that we must overhaul our approach to economic development in Rural America. The framework of the new effort recognizes that the rural economy of tomorrow will be a regional economy. No one community will prosper in isolation."

Phase I and II SET States



SET: A Genuine Partnership

- Phase I: \$350,000 investment by USDA RD
- **Phase II:** Additional \$1.7M investment by RD
- RRDCs and Extension have developed materials and taken the lead in the delivering of SET training to regional teams

- Strong evaluation research plan being carried out
- What's ahead?
 - Expansion of SET. All said, 65 regions/30 states will have been part of SET
 - Revision of SET materials taking place in May/June
 - New modules to be added (4-6 in all) this Summer
